

IHDS Finds....

Dalits and Adivasis are less likely to move out of poverty and more likely to fall into poverty.



The study examines the dynamic nature of movements into and out of poverty over a period when poverty has fallen substantially in India.

Using IHDS panel data for 2004-05 and 2011-12, Thorat, Vanneman, Desai and Dubey find that the risks of marginalised

communities such as Dalits and Adivasis falling into or remaining in poverty were higher than concomitant risks for more privileged groups. Some, but not all of these higher risks are explained by the educational, financial, and social disadvantages faced by these groups in 2005.

Results from a logistic regression show that the factors which help people escape poverty differ from those that push people into it and that the strength of their effects varies.



Amit Thorat is an Assistant Professor at Jawaharlal Nehru University in New Delhi, India. Dr. Thorat formerly worked at NCAER on the IHDS Project from 2010 to 2015. Dr. Thorat was the principal trainer for IHDS-II, spending nearly a year in the field in 2011-2012.


